



HINTS AND TIPS

Excerpt from "The Eyes have it" from the Caricature Carvers of America. Ron Dowdy on eyes:


Like everything elso in caricature carving, there is not a right or wrong way, and since caricature carving can span that continuum between realistic and cartoon, eyes can vary greatly, with the most important factor being that they are consistent with the carving as a whole. My caricatures tend to lean more to the realistic and my eyes follow suit with certain elements exaggerated: maybe extra heavy eyelids, eyes extremely open or "popping" eyeballs...whatever further carries the expression I'm trying to convey.

I will begin by carving an oversized normal eye to show all the basic cuts and then show some possibilities when some elements are modified and exaggerated.



←Step 1:

I start with an eye mound. While the the mound is recessed below the forehead, if I think in terms of an eye "socket", I carve it too deep and end up needing to have the highest part of the eye in the deepest part of the socket. When carving a mound I have already accounted for the foundation for an eye with roundness and downward slope.



Next I draw the opening and cut it in with a stop cut.





←Step 3:

Now round the eyeball by taking the corners out with a triangular cut and bevel the top of the eyeball back the depth of the eyelid. I then do the same for the bottom eyelid. This makes for a very "bug eyed" eyeball making the next step very important. Start at the top of the eyeball and carve downward to the bottom eyelid maintaining the curvature.



Finish the eye by relieving the lower eyelid to show it coming under the upper lid; put a shadow in the corner of the eye by taking out a very small triangle; add wrinkles and pencil in appropriate iris and pupil as a reminder when painting. This will create a relaxed eye which can be used in many carvings and can be adapted as needed to create many expressions.

HINTS AND TIPS





Expressions:



Let's look how these basic steps can be adapted to create multiple expressions: Starting with the eye mounds and exaggerated smile line, let's look at a winking elf with a relaxed eye and a winking eye.



Starting with the eye mounds, let's look at a smiling elf with closed eyes. Note that even with closed eyes the foundation of the eye mound is still needed.









Again, starting with eye mounds, look at a surprised expression with wide open and bulging eyes. Note also the important role the iris makes.





Finally, a mad expression with eyebrows pulled down covering the upper portion of a wide open eye.



From a carving standpoint, all the eyes started with a similar foundation of an eye mound but totally different expressions were achieved by slightly modifying the mound and changing other elements of the face to compliment.

I understand that many consider the eyes the most important aspect of the face: the first thing that catches a viewer's attention; sets the mood of the carving, etc. However, remember the eyes are only one element in portraying an expression. Although important, the eyes, eyebrows, nose, mouth and wrinkles all must play in concert to convey the desired expression. How many mad or mean looking Santas have we seen because all the elements weren't singing from the same sheet of music? The eyes may have been happy but the eyebrows were lowered and tense, creating an unhappy St Nick.

Happy Carving. May the journey never end!
